FIELD SEMINAR - WINTER 2022/23

**INSTRUCTOR:** Samuel Archibald, M.E.M.

**INSTRUCTOR BIOGRAPHY:** Sam Archibald is a Lead Field Educator for Yellowstone Forever. After completing his B.A. in history, Sam served with the US Peace Corps, working with an Ecuadorian nonprofit organization to develop outdoor leadership and environmental education programs for youth. Sam has continued to focus on outdoor education, joining the National Park Service as a Crew Leader for the Yellowstone Youth Conservation Corps and earning his Master's degree in Environmental Management. Sam is grateful for every day he gets to spend out in the Greater Yellowstone Ecosystem and looks forward to the continual discoveries offered by this wild and wonderful landscape.

**ACTIVITY LEVEL:** This course is an activity <u>level 2</u> and students enrolled in this course are expected to be active participants. Be prepared to hike, snowshoe, or ski on snow-packed trails, up to 3 miles per day, with climbs up to 250 feet. \*

\*All field activities will be conducted as a group. If you cannot meet the activity level expectations during your program, you may be restricted from participation in daily outings. We will not alter program itineraries or activities to accommodate participants who cannot meet the expectations of the stated activity level.

LOCATION: Lamar Buffalo Ranch – Yellowstone National Park, WY

**PROGRAM DATES & TIMES:** The program begins at 5:30 p.m. on Monday, February 6, 2023, and goes through Thursday, February 9, 2023, at 7:00 p.m.

**LODGING CHECK-IN & CHECK-OUT:** Lodging check-in begins at 4:00 p.m. on Monday, February 6, 2023 and lodging check-out is at 10:00 a.m. on Friday, February 10, 2023.

**MEALS:** This course is catered. If you have any food allergies or dietary restrictions, please include those in your registration form.

**SHUTTLES:** For an additional fee, we provide an optional Bozeman airport shuttle for those interested. The shuttle service will pick up participants from the Bozeman International Airport on the first day of the program with a 1:00 p.m. departure. The shuttle will return participants to the Bozeman International Airport on the last day after lodging check-out with a departure from the Lamar Buffalo Ranch at 8:00 a.m. If you opt-in to the shuttle service, please ensure that your flight booking will allow for you to be picked up and dropped off during the above timeframes.

#### PROGRAM ITINERARY

Winter in Yellowstone is a wonderful time to visit – less people, enchanting snowscape scenery, and opportunities to view Yellowstone's lesser-seen wildlife. Although much of the wildlife viewing may be possible from the road, each day will consist of short snowshoe jaunts. While snowshoeing participants will learn more about wildlife that thrive in Yellowstone's harsh winter climate. Tracks and signs of various species will also be examined in the field with a comprehensive look at wildlife ecology within the Greater Yellowstone Ecosystem, to include winter adaptations, natural history, and wildlife management. Evenings will be spent at the historic Lamar Buffalo Ranch surrounded by new and existing friends, conversing about that day's activities and hosting facilitated discussions related to Yellowstone specific topics.

The itinerary is designed to take advantage of the best opportunities in the park, but may be adjusted to adapt to weather conditions, wildlife activity, holidays, and road construction.

The details and timing of the agenda are subject to change.

### 2/6/23 Welcome

Participants are welcome to check into the Lamar Buffalo Ranch starting at 4:00 p.m. Class orientation begins at 5:30 p.m.

# 2/7 - 2/9/23 Wildlife Watching and Observations

Mornings will be spent in the field looking for wildlife. During the day, the group will take snowshoe jaunts and learn about snow tracking, winter ecology, and wildlife management. After dinner, participants will have the evenings to relax on their own or join the larger group to discuss wildlife controversies.
