INSTRUCTOR: Amanda Evans

INSTRUCTOR BIOGRAPHY: Amanda Evans is a Yellowstone Forever lead field educator. Her passion for wildlife and wild places has taken her to working in California, Texas, Wyoming, Alaska, and Montana. She feels that it is through firsthand experience with the natural world that people build the strongest connections to it. Her goal is to use education to foster the same appreciation she feels and to inspire others to preserve and protect nature in all spaces.

ACTIVITY LEVEL: This course is activity <u>level 2</u> and students enrolled in this course are expected to be active participants. Be prepared for hikes on snow-packed trails, or snowshoe or ski trips, up to 3 miles per day with climbs up to 250 feet.

*All field activities will be conducted as a group. If participants cannot meet the activity level expectations during the program, they may be restricted from participation in daily outings. Program itineraries or activities will not be altered to accommodate participants who cannot meet the expectations of the stated activity level.

LOCATION: Lamar Buffalo Ranch – Yellowstone National Park, WY

PROGRAM DATES & TIMES: The program begins at 5:30 p.m. on Monday, March 18, 2024, and goes through Thursday, March 21, 2024, at 5:00 p.m.

LODGING CHECK-IN & CHECK-OUT: Lodging check-in begins at 4:00 p.m. on Monday, March 18, 2024 and lodging check-out is at 9:00 a.m. on Friday, March 22, 2024.

MEALS: This course is catered. Any food allergies or dietary restrictions should be noted on the registration form.

SHUTTLES: For an additional fee, an optional Bozeman airport shuttle is provided for those interested. The shuttle service will pick up participants from the Bozeman International Airport on the first day of the program (Monday, March 18, 2024) with a 1:00 p.m. departure. The shuttle will return participants to the Bozeman International Airport on the last day after check-out (Friday, March 22, 2024) with a departure from the Lamar Buffalo Ranch at 8:00 a.m. Participants opting into the shuttle service, need to ensure their flights will allow for them to be picked up and dropped off during the above timeframes.

PROGRAM ITINERARY

There are few things more iconic than watching wolves within Yellowstone's winter snowscapes. Yellowstone Forever's iconic and ever-popular Winter Wolf Week allows participants to experience firsthand the winter world of wolves. Days will be spent searching for wolves and other charismatic wildlife, both from the roadway and out in the field via snowshoe jaunts. Participants will be led by knowledgeable Yellowstone Forever Lead Field Educators who spend nearly every day out in the field searching for Yellowstone wildlife. Additionally, there will be opportunities to engage with Yellowstone wolf researchers and experts both out in the field and in the evenings at the historic Lamar Buffalo Ranch. Topics covered throughout the week range from wolf behavior, wolf conservation and natural history, and wolf management. This is a premiere opportunity to become familiar with this iconic species whilst based out of the heart of Yellowstone's famed Lamar Valley.

The itinerary is designed to take advantage of the best opportunities in the park, but may be adjusted to adapt to weather conditions, wildlife activity, holidays, and road construction.

The details and timing of the agenda are subject to change.

Day 1 Welcome

Participants are welcome to check into the Lamar Buffalo Ranch starting at 4:00 p.m. Class orientation begins at 5:30 p.m.

Dinner at 6:00 p.m.

After dinner meet and greet and introduction to the course.

Days 2 - 4 Wildlife Watching

With a focus on wildlife, days will consist of a mixture of early morning roadside wildlife watching and early afternoon wildlife discussions. In the mid-afternoon the class will go for a hike (or snowshoe depending on snowpack) and have lunch in the field. The class will return late in the afternoon for free time and dinner and be followed with an evening presentation.
