FIELD SEMINAR - WINTER 2023/24

INSTRUCTOR: Kevin League, M.A.

INSTRUCTOR BIOGRAPHY: Kevin League, M.A., is a Helena, Montana based award-winning professional landscape, lifestyle, and wildlife photographer, capturing Montana and the western United States' most beautiful, fleeting, and fascinating moments. He has been a student of photography for several decades beginning as a teenager when his parents handed down their 35mm film Nikon cameras to him. Fast forward a few decades later, Kevin would establish his photography business in 2015, and in 2020 he opened a gallery in downtown Helena, fulfilling a lifelong dream and quickly becoming one of Montana's favorite new visual artists. Inspired by early conservation photographers, Kevin believes his ability to share the beauty of our last best places will inspire others to respect, protect, and enjoy them. Kevin has dedicated his life to conservation through his photography, educational workshops and throughout a career protecting natural places that has spanned over 20 years with governmental and non-governmental organizations.

ACTIVITY LEVEL: This course is activity <u>level 2</u> and students enrolled in this course are expected to be active participants. Be prepared for hikes on snow-packed trails, or snowshoe trips, up to 3 miles per day with climbs up to 250 feet.

*All field activities will be conducted as a group. If participants cannot meet the activity level expectations during the program, they may be restricted from participation in daily outings. Program itineraries or activities will not be altered to accommodate participants who cannot meet the expectations of the stated activity level.

LOCATION: Course begins at the Yellowstone Forever classrooms located in Gardiner, MT.

PROGRAM DATES & TIMES: The program begins at 7:00 PM on Friday, February 23, 2024, and ends on Sunday, February 25, 2024, at 6:30 PM.

LODGING CHECK-IN & CHECK-OUT: No lodging is provided for this course, however, there may be limited lodging available through Yellowstone Forever at the Yellowstone Field Overlook Campus. PROGRAM ITINERARY

Winter is one of the most splendid times to capture Yellowstone's wildlife and stunning snow-covered landscape! This workshop focuses on capturing the park's pristine winter scenery and abundant wildlife. Explore the park's northern region from Gardiner, through Mammoth Hot Springs to Lamar Valley and beyond - stopping to capture the park's inspiring winter landscape scenes while searching for elusive predators like wolves, foxes, and coyotes, as well as large mammals like bighorned sheep, moose, elk, bison, and mule deer.

There is no doubt about it, winter in Yellowstone is cold, but being prepared, having the right gear and a positive mindset will make the best of the challenging conditions and help capture the best images. While there will be a classroom period on day one, discussing camera techniques and settings, a solid <u>understanding of photography fundamentals and camera features and settings is mandatory for this workshop</u>. Newcomers to photography or new camera owners, should spend the time necessary to become familiar with their gear. For example, participants should be able to change ISO, aperture, shutter speed and focus points, with gloves on and without looking at the screen, in addition to learning where to activate the camera's live view, different autofocus settings, exposure bracketing and self-timer functions as well, as these features will be used frequently during the time together.

The itinerary is designed to take advantage of the best opportunities in the park, but may be adjusted to adapt to weather conditions, wildlife activity, holidays, and road construction.

The details and timing of the agenda are subject to change.

Day 1 Evening Orientation

Welcome and introductions.

Participants will meet in one of the Yellowstone Forever Classrooms in the rear area of the Yellowstone Forever building in Gardiner for orientation. The class will go over the program itinerary, discuss clothing and equipment needed for daily outings, and answer any questions participants may have. Participants will spend some time in the classroom discussing camera technique and settings for landscape and wildlife photography.

Days 2 - 3 Field days

On these days, the class will be meeting early (before sunrise ~7:30 a.m.) and staying out late (after sunset ~5:45 p.m.). There will be some time in the mid-day for sharing tips and techniques and taking some well-deserved downtime. On day three, the class will conclude the workshop after returning from a sunset shot near Mammoth or Gardiner (~5:45 p.m.)

PROGRAM EQUIPMENT

This course requires participants to bring the items listed below. Additionally, for general program gear and for a full list of what is included in this course, check out the <u>Gardiner Field Seminars - Winter General Information</u> document.

REQUIRED CAMERA GEAR

If participants have two camera bodies, they should consider bringing both, setting up one camera/lens for wildlife and another for landscape. This minimizes the time necessary to swap lenses and can help capture fleeting moments and brief encounters with wildlife more quickly.
