FIELD SEMINAR - SUMMER 2024

INSTRUCTOR: Katy Duffy, M.S.

INSTRUCTOR BIOGRAPHY: Katy Duffy has studied owls, diurnal raptors and other birds in the Greater Yellowstone Ecosystem by banding, surveying and other techniques for more than 35 years. Katy loves to share her knowledge of avian ecology and identification. She worked for the National Park Service as a supervisory education ranger in Yellowstone and Grand Teton national parks for 32 years. Katy has a M.S. in ecology from Rutgers University.

ACTIVITY LEVEL: This course is activity <u>level 2</u> and students enrolled in this course are expected to be active participants. Be prepared to hike up to 3 miles per day, comfortably, with elevation gains up to 600 feet. Some off-trail hiking possible.

*All field activities will be conducted as a group. If participants cannot meet the activity level expectations during the program, they may be restricted from participation in daily outings. Program itineraries or activities will not be altered to accommodate participants who cannot meet the expectations of the stated activity level.

LOCATION: Course begins at the Yellowstone Forever classrooms located in Gardiner, MT.

PROGRAM DATES & TIMES: The program begins at 7:00 p.m. on Friday, May 24, 2024, and goes through Sunday, May 26, 2024, at 12:00 p.m.

LODGING CHECK-IN & CHECK-OUT: No lodging is provided for this course, however, there may be limited lodging available through Yellowstone Forever at the Yellowstone Field Overlook Campus. PROGRAM ITINERARY

Are you curious about owls and their mostly nocturnal activity? You will spend classroom time examining owl wings, tails, and feet (on loan from Yellowstone National Park) along with a presentation showing images of owls found in Yellowstone and their preferred habitats. You will also learn the vocalizations owls make when they are seeking a mate. You will then explore owl habitat during an afternoon field trip. That evening, you will conduct a sample owl survey. The following morning, you will explore additional habitat for different owl species.

The itinerary is designed to take advantage of the best opportunities in the park, but may be adjusted to adapt to weather conditions, wildlife activity, holidays, and road construction.

The details and timing of the agenda are subject to change.

Day 1 Welcome

The program starts with an evening orientation. You will get to know one another and be introduced to the program. Throughout the evening, the itinerary and seminar key concepts will be discussed, as well as what to expect to pack for the field each day.

Day 2 Reading the Landscape for Owls, part 1.

First, you will view a PowerPoint of owl images and owl habitat and listen to owl vocalizations. Then you will spend the early afternoon in the park, seeing owl habitat. up-close. Following a late afternoon & dinner break, you will bundle up, take your headlamp, then head back into the park to experience owl time, early evening, to listen for vocalizing owls.

Day 3 Reading the Landscape for Owls, part 2.

You will go to a different part of the park to witness habitat for other owl species. The class will conclude with a summary and end at noon.
